### Specialized Course on Select WTO Issues: Agriculture, Services, TRIPs and RTAs

#### From 13 November to 22 November 2023

#### **Background and Rationale for Training**

The establishment of the World Trade Organisation (WTO) has created a complex, rules-based system wherein developing and least developed countries are faced with a number of opportunities and challenges. It becomes imperative for policy makers and negotiators to have a comprehensive understanding of these issues as well as of the parallel growth of regional trade agreements. This would support their capacity for prepared and coherent approaches to commitments in the above areas, towards effective participation in the multilateral trading system and reaping its benefits.

Among the disciplines being created and administered by the WTO, it is important to have indepth and specialized knowledge of the nature of commitments being undertaken and the dynamics of the negotiations underway. For the purpose of the proposed training the WTO agreements and negotiations in the domains of agriculture, services, and trade related intellectual property rights will be taken up for intensive study, as well as implications of the burgeoning complexity of regional trade agreements.

The relevance of concluding successful negotiations and effective implementation can be marked in each of the identified areas. Improved market access and reduced trade distorting subsidies in the trade of agricultural goods would allow for predictability and security for both importing and exporting countries alike and a fairer market for producers. Services are the fastest growing sector in the global economy and the enormous potential for trade in services merits attention and exploration by the developing and least developed countries. Trade-related aspects of intellectual property rights (TRIPs) present a controversial area that hold particular interest for developing and least developing countries, especially given the implications for public health, protecting traditional knowledge and culture specific products, etc. The mushrooming of regional trade agreements in turn is also creating an increasingly intricate and overlapping network of provisions including those on agriculture, Services and IPRs etc.

#### **Course Structure and Duration**

Given the rationale for the training, the Centre has developed a capacity building programme towards enhancing the understanding of these specific issues as they come under the purview of the WTO, their context, scope and coverage, rights and obligations of member countries under the various agreements, special provisions for developing and least developed countries, and negotiating dynamics.

The training will be imparted through classroom sessions including lectures, training tools as case studies, mock negotiations and group work. The tentative programme agenda and schedule for the training is provided at Section II-B.2 of the Annex.

The duration of the training programme will be eight working days and a weekend in between. The classroom sessions and field visits will be scheduled during the course of the eight working days and a cultural visit to the Taj Mahal at Agra will be organised during the intervening weekend.

### **Eligibility for Participation**

The programme is intended for senior and middle level Government officials working in the Trade or Commerce Ministries in developing and least developed country, with a specific interest and knowledge in the identified areas.

#### **Faculty and Pedagogy**

Experts and Resource Persons specialising in the identified components of the trade discourse would conduct the classroom sessions. These include faculty of the Centre for WTO Studies and the Indian Institute of Foreign Trade, senior officials of the Department of Commerce, Government of India, as well as representatives from international institutions.

The pedagogy for the programme will include lectures, discussions and panel presentations as well as case studies and group work to provide participants with opportunities to develop their skills. Indian trade negotiators at the WTO will also be invited to provide their insights and stimulate discussion in these sessions.

#### **Medium of Instruction**

The medium of instruction will be English and no translation will be available.

## **Organisation of Training Programme**

It is proposed that the Centre organise the training programme in collaboration with the Indian Technical and Economic Cooperation (ITEC) Programme of the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.
